Bartlesville Public Library is proud to offer you best-selling and classic eBooks, audiobooks, magazines, and videos available 24/7 from the library's digital collection, <http://okvirtuallibrary.lib.overdrive.com>.

You can browse the collection, borrow with your library card, and enjoy on your computer, tablet, smartphone or eReader device. Most borrowed eBooks can be enjoyed immediately in your web browser with OverDrive Read. Or, you can download eBooks into free software, Adobe® Digital Editions, or send to your Kindle® device or app. Downloaded eBooks can be transferred to eReader devices such as NOOK®, Sony® Reader™ and many more.

Audiobooks, magazines and videos can be downloaded into OverDrive® Media Console™ (just MP3 audiobooks for Mac® users). Once downloaded, titles can be enjoyed immediately or transferred to a variety of devices, including iPod® and many others. Some audio titles can also be burned to CD to listen on-the-go.

Users with smartphones or tablets can install the OverDrive Media Console app to directly download EPUB eBooks and MP3 audiobooks titles to their device. No matter how you plan to enjoy, titles will automatically expire at the end of the lending period. There are no late fees!

## New Newspaper Archives Online

We are pleased to announce that we now subscribe to Newspaper Archive, the world's largest online newspaper archive. This service is provided by ProQuest, which also provides both Ancestry and now Fold3.

With interesting finds for general users and genealogists alike, this database is super easy to use and navigate. And it is available at home any time day or night from your home computer and tablet. Simply go to the Library's home page and click on the Online Databases link. Then click on Newspaper Archive Central, and log in using your library card number and pin number (last 4 digits of your phone number). Once you are logged in Newspaper Archive, you can browse by location, date, or search for a specific name or phrase. You can save, print and email files.

At this point we are only able to subscribe to a small part of this database. Our subscription includes Oklahoma (1840-2012), Kansas (1868-2016), Missouri (1821-2014), Nebraska (1867-1977), South Dakota (1881-2007), North Dakota (1873-2007), Minnesota (1834-2007). We hope in the future we will be able to add additional state newspapers

## New Microfilm

Have you ever needed information from an older local newspaper and were not sure how to find it? Have your searches for it on the Internet been unsuccessful?

In the Local and Family History Department at the Library, we have older issues of Bartlesville newspapers on microfilm going all the way back to 1895, when the area was still Indian Territory.

You can also look at microfilm reels from other local town newspapers such as the *Ramona Herald*, *Dewey World*, *Ochelata Outlook*, *Vera Monitor* and the *Copan Leader*. Though we do not have the complete collections of these newspapers, they may still help you find missing information with these early area oil boom communities.

New to our microfilm collection are newspapers from Skiatook (from 1905-1951). This newspaper collection also covers area news for Vera, Ramona, Ochelata, Wildhorse, Ringo, Sperry, Collinsville, Avant and Oglesby communities. The Skiatook newspaper can help fill in missing information not found in the Bartlesville or other Washington county newspapers in regards to births, deaths, marriages, educational and military news.
